

Making A Difference Through Giving

Why do we give money to the church? I imagine everyone has their own answer to this question. For me, the reasons are many.

To model generosity for others
To let go of control of a portion of my financial resources for the sake of God's mission in the world
To follow God's command from scripture
To limit my spending such that I clearly prioritize
giving

To help fund the ministries of the congregation To make a difference in the world

That last reason, to make a difference in the world, moves me like nothing else. The ministry of Grace and the ministry of the ELCA at large makes a huge difference in our neighborhood, in Phoenix, and in the world. People of God, who we are together and what we do together makes a positive difference in our neighborhood and in Phoenix. Quite obviously, our outreach ministries and ministry partners meet the immediate needs of people in our neighborhood on a weekly basis. Through our hospitality ministry, we create space for people to nurture personal connections with others, connection being the most fundamental of our needs as humans. In our worship and music ministries, we share some of the deepest parts of who we are with one another in worship and by creating music together. Via our faith formation ministries, we grow as children of God and serve others. Through the gift that is our property, we provide space not only for our ministries but for other groups to nurture their spiritual lives, including Kaleo, New Life in Christ, and Native American Urban Ministry. The gift of our property extends not only to the spiritual lives of others but to other groups that utilize our property to create music, to celebrate the gift of marriage, and to nurture connections, groups such as The Trunk Space, Phoenix Children's Choir, Sisters of the Valley, and couples getting married.

Our posture of openness to our community and generosity of spirit are of great value in a world divided. Those who visit worship on Sunday mornings consistently speak of feeling truly welcomed and valued. What a huge gift that we are able to open our arms this way—both to people we have known for years and to those we have just met! This welcome, possible because we each search for God's image in our neighbor, makes a difference in the world.

And don't even get me started on the ways the ELCA at large touches people throughout the world!

During October and November, we will raise up how we make a difference through giving—at the ELCA churchwide level, on the synodical level, here at Grace, and in our personal lives. Almost all of these ministries require monetary resources in order to make them happen, and we invite and encourage all who participate at Grace to help make these ministries happen—both through presence and financial gifts. By Sunday, November 3, you are invited and encouraged to have turned in your Mission Planning Card (included in this newsletter) indicating how you will give monetarily to Grace in 2020. Reflections on the ELCA Churchwide Assembly Renee Waterstradt

Peace and blessings to my siblings in Christ! It was my honor and privilege to attend the ELCA Churchwide Assembly in Milwaukee, WI the first full week of August. What an amazing experience!

The Churchwide Assembly consisted of 927 voting members from 65 synods, 9100+ congregations representing the more than 3.5 million baptized members of the ELCA. There was much important work to do as we discern where the Lord is leading us as an entire church body. Along with the usual financial discussions regarding the budget,

revisions to the Churchwide Constitution and rejoicing in all the ministries we as the ELCA are involved with across the globe, there were some noteworthy items that I would like to share.

The first order of business was to discern and elect a new Presiding Bishop of the ELCA. Rev Elizabeth Eaton has served in this role for the past 6 years and was overwhelmingly re-elected on the first ecclesiastical ballot with over 81% of the vote. She is truly a special leader and it was amazing to see the Spirit at work in this process.

The Assembly was also tasked with the election of a new Secretary. Deacon Sue Rothmeyer was elected to serve as the Secretary after having been the executive for administration in the Office of Secretary and will replace Rev Wm Chris Boerger who is retiring at the end of his term.

The Assembly approved a plethora of memorials, social statements, a budget in excess of \$68 billion dollars each of the next three years, declared itself a sanctuary church body, affirming our commitment to immigrants and refugees, celebrated the conclusion of the Always Being Made New: The Campaign for the ELCA having raised almost \$250 million dollars since 2013 and celebrated the 50th Anniversary of the ELCA's ordination of women, the 40th Anniversary of the ordination of women of color and the 10th Anniversary of the decision to remove barriers to ordination for individuals in same-gender relationships. I was overcome with the presence of the Holy Spirit throughout the week. From the time I wandered into the Wisconsin Center in Milwaukee, not knowing what to expect and trying to figure out where in the hall the Grand Canyon Synod was supposed to sit, I could feel the Spirit at work. The myriad of volunteers, making sure everything was in place and working smoothly, the church leaders from not only the ELCA but from church bodies across the world discussing our ministries together and the worship services that were held each morning were awe-inspiring. I established new relationships with people from our local synod that I may have known casually or by sight as well as forging brand new relationships with Pastors and lay leaders on the other side of the country. There are so many ways that we as the ELCA strive to share the love of Christ in our world and the Churchwide Assembly embodied that spirit of service.

Please don't hesitate to come up and ask me about the Churchwide Assembly when you see me at church! I can't possibly do justice to the whole experience in this brief note in our newsletter. I could not be more humbled and honored to have been able to represent Grace and the Grand Canyon Synod as a voting member at Churchwide Assembly. We truly are Church Together!

The Vicar's Vantage Point

Dear People of Grace,

This is hard for me to believe, but I am beginning my eighth week as Grace Lutheran's seminary intern! As they say, time flies when you are having fun, and I am most certainly enjoying my time with you!

One of the ways I am trying to get to know the Grace community is through the gathering of individual stories and experiences of Grace Lutheran Church: stories from within the community and through the voices of our neighbors. The first phase of this project is to "interview" community members about their involvement in Grace's ministry, asking for stories of when this community has been at its best, and posing questions about Grace's future in the neighborhood. This phase is currently in progress, and it is my joy to share two clear patterns that have emerged from these stories:

- 1) You truly love one another, and experience Grace Lutheran as true community. Grace is a place to be fully yourself trusting you will be loved and accepted for who you are, no matter your circumstances. During a time of great loss in their life, one member described the people of Grace in this way: "There is great joy here in this community. True friendship. There is a feeling of comfort in this community, a sense of peace and timelessness. I don't know that I would have made it through that time in my life without these people. Talk about the Holy Spirit so clearly there for you through a people."
- 2) You may not know what the future looks like for Grace in the neighborhood, but you know God is leading. Downtown Phoenix is changing: new construction, new businesses and new neighbors are arriving in the neighborhood. A natural question to ask is: "who are we called to be in relationship to the changes in our neighborhood?" While the community may not concrete answers to this question (and that is ok!), there is an unwavering confidence that God has it in hand. Commenting on Grace's future and contributions to the neighborhood, one community member stated: "We're in the city for good. Do you know how many businesses and organizations have lasted 100 years? I don't know of that many, but Grace has. Someone here has made a covenant with God. Grace will continue to be a place of safety and will continue to generously contribute to the life of the community in the future."

God speaks through God's people. In the sharing and gathering of Grace's stories, we begin to see how God is the author of Grace Lutheran's story. These stories

affirm who we are as a community of faith in Christ. These stories affirm how the Holy Spirit has gifted Grace Lutheran for relationships both within and beyond our community. These stories position us to look towards God's future with hope and with the desire to align ourselves with what God is doing now.

PARTNERSHIP SPOTLIGHT

First Congregational United Church of Christ (UCC)

Just north of Grace two blocks, First Congregational United Church of Christ at 1407 N 2 nd Street reaches out to our shared neighborhood for the sake of God's mission in the world. Around here, First UCC is known as the "white steeple church" with whom we have partnered on various endeavors for at least the last eight years. Each year, both Grace and First UCC participate in the Phoenix CROPWalk. Each summer, First UCC provides sack lunches for heat respite; this year, they provided sack lunches for nine full days of the program! In fact, their congregation prepared the sack lunches after church on Sunday morning and then delivered them to us for Monday lunch. Most recently, First UCC participated along with Grace, Trinity Cathedral, and St. Mary's Basilica in the Ecumenical Vigil for Remembrance and Change in response to the gun violence in our nation. Some years, First UCC has been a partner in Thanksgiving Eve Worship and World AIDS Day remembrances, and they are active in the community in many ways—as a sanctuary church, by gathering people for social change, and by hosting Joshua Tree which is a food and health ministry for folks who are HIV positive. We give thanks to God for the partnership of First Congregational United Church of Christ!
