The Church of Christ In Ev'ry Age

This month, as our community building goal, we imagine what the church of 10 years from now will look like. We imagine this together because, if we are proactive in doing so, we will fashion the church of 2029 instead of simply reacting to it. We, as the body of Christ, will shape it

Imagining the church of the future, at least for me, compels me to consider the very nature of the church. In seminary language, what we are exploring is ecclesiology. Honestly, when we got to the study of ecclesiology in my systemic theology class, I wasn't too excited. I read the assigned books reluctantly and breathed a sigh of relief that my professor assigned no paper on the topic. But now, I am intrigued by what it means to be the church.

For the church has taken different forms and had different purposes in every age of its life. US Christians in 2019 tend to think of the church as always taking the form and serving the purpose it did during the early and mid-20 th century in the US—as a social center of life in which everyone took part. While we may believe that this is the best form that church can take, it is by no means the only form church has taken in its 2000-year history. The early Christian church of the 1st and 2nd centuries worshiped in homes and embraced no formal ordination of clergy or structure. The focus of the early Christian church was community: joint prayer, meals, hymn-singing, serving one another, even sharing possessions. Testifying to faith preceded martyrdom in a time when the Roman Empire persecuted Christians. Moving into the time of the "church fathers [and mothers]," a time of theological formation in the 4th and 5th centuries, the church hotly debated foundational theological beliefs. From this age emerged our creeds with doctrines reflected in them such as the Trinity and Jesus' full humanity and full divinity.

By the time of the Reformation, the European church served a very different purpose: largely to distribute divine absolution and judgment with a heavy focus on Holy Communion in public worship. The common people didn't even understand the language in which the priests spoke! Fast forward 300 years and cross the ocean to the pioneer days of the US, and the church was building institutions as communities of faith set up shop across the country: hospitals, colleges, nursing homes, schools for the blind and deaf, seminaries, and a plethora of charitable organizations feeding, clothing, and housing people. Many congregations were built at this time and many church bodies established. We can hardly imagine a United States without the presence of the church at its center.

Where and how is the Holy Spirit calling the church next? What is our vocation in 2019 and moving forward? A new vocation doesn't mean that the previous vocation was inadequate or ineffective. Far from it, actually. Just as an individual can finish their work in a particular place and in a particular role and then move on to new workplace and a new role, so too has the church fulfilled its call in ages past. Now, I believe God has called us to something new, and indeed, that is what God has done all along. In every age, God has called the people of God to do a new thing, guided by the Holy Spirit. As we discern what God has for us in this coming age, we remember the words of a familiar hymn:

The church of Christ in ev'ry age beset by change, but Spirit-led, Must claim and test its heritage and keep on rising from the dead.
